Superintendent's Message

It is amazing that we are already rapidly approaching the midpoint of the school year. I have spent a great deal of time in the buildings meeting students and teachers. Our goal of personalizing the learning environment for our students is evident as I observe the great work being done by the entire staff. From riding a bus to attending athletic events, I am very impressed with our efforts to see that students have a safe environment in which to learn and grow. We have great students as well as amazing educators working in the Concrete School District.

This year we have added Edgenuity, an online provider in which students in grades six through twelve can access online courses that are approved by OSPI. This online program can be utilized for initial credit, credit retrieval, honors courses and advanced placement offerings. This excellent opportunity enables a student to complete courses needed for graduation as well as additional courses that challenge the accelerated learner. If your child is interested in this program, please contact Mr. Holbrook at the high school and he will assist in registering for courses.

Our English Language Arts curriculum is in the review process with a pilot program being implemented at the elementary level. We will be adopting materials K-12 with an emphasis on building skills at each grade level that meet or exceed common core standards and prepare our students for state assessments. Our goal is to have a recommendation to the school board for their approval by early spring. New materials will be utilized in the 2018-19 school year.

We are currently seeking parents, students and community members to serve on our strategic plan and discipline review committees. We will begin the process of reviewing and updating the district's strategic plan in January with our final product being completed by May of 2018. Once completed this plan will serve as a guide to the principles and goals to be accomplished for the Concrete School District. Beginning in February a committee will review our discipline policies. Community input in the development of our strategic plan and the review of discipline procedures is essential in charting the direction of the district. Student academic performance is a focus for the district, and during our recent conferences the elementary reached 89% parent participation. Thank you to everyone who attended these conferences. As parents, you are critical in placing value on your child's education. Let's see if we can hit 100% in the spring!!! Attendance also matters in determining the success of our students and is a critical life skill for future employment of our graduates and success in the workplace. There is a direct correlation between attendance and student performance, and while we are seeing progress at all levels we have room to improve.

The community dinners have been outstanding! Please join me in thanking the elementary staff and the Community Bible Church for hosting the first two dinners. 


What Lifts You?


Girls on the Run ...



Nevertheless, this year's event was considered a success and organizers were extremely thankful to the 578,704 that participated and to the valuable causes they helped along the way! 

SCHOOL DELAYS & CLOSURES



We are approaching the time of year when the weather can change quickly. The bus drivers are reviewing with their students the importance of having a safe place to wait for their buses. Icy roads can cause slippery situations. When a bus approaches a bus stop to pick up students on icy roads, even the slightest application of brakes can cause the back of the bus to slide. Students need to stay back and not approach the bus until the bus is **completely stopped** and the driver has opened the door. The open bus door will be the signal for students that it is safe to board the bus. Please go over this information with your children.

Concrete School District has an automated system in place (SchoolMessenger) to automatically call families of our students in the event of emergency school closures, late start, and student absences. If you have a cell phone and would like to be contacted via cell, please contact your child's school with your cell phone number. In the event of a delay or closure you should receive an automated call.

Concrete School District is also a member of the Puget Sound Emergency Communications System. Please tune to your local television or radio station for updates on school delays and closures. Just So You Know...

DEVICES ON SCHOOL BUSES

Singer-songwriter BOB MARLEY once said:

"One good thing about music, when it hits you, you feel no pain".

That may be true **UNLESS YOU ARE ON THE SCHOOL BUS.**

It seems that most of our Concrete School students now have some device that plays music. While that may be good for the child, it is not so good for the bus and bus driver when forty or fifty students try to play their music while on the bus. Too much music is a bother on the bus. It is distracting to the driver and has become a problem. Students may not listen to their music without headphones or ear buds while on the bus. First offense the bus driver shall warn the student and ask them to put their device away. Thereafter will follow progressive discipline up to and including confiscating the device for a period of time.

Help your student be part of the solution and not a continuing problem. Speak with them about how to best play music on the bus and retain their music device. Thank you!



Child Find Screening

What is a Child Find Screening?

Screening is a free check of your child's development including:

- Large muscle development
- Eye-hand coordination (fine motor skills)
- Communication
- Concepts
- Personal-social skills
- Self-help skills

What is the purpose of a Child Find Screening?

The purpose of the screen is to identify any factors that may interfere with your child's learning, growth, and development. The screening is also provided to help parents identify their child's strengths and weaknesses and provide home suggestions.

What happens during a Child Find Screening?

During the screening, your child may stack small blocks, cut with a scissors, draw, count, name colors, jump, and have fun! Following the screening, a trained professional will talk with you about the results of the screening. You will have the opportunity to ask any questions about your child's development. You may be given home suggestions, referred on for further testing, or be scheduled to have skills rechecked at a later date. The screening process usually takes about 45 minutes.

Who is eligible to be screened?

Any child, birth to age five, whose family or care givers would like more information about their child's development. All school districts within Washington State have Child Find screenings available. If your family is living in a temporary situation, you may contact the district where you are staying to attend a screening.

FOR YOUR INFORMATION

HOMELESS –MCKINNEY-VENTO

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Assistance Act is a federal law that ensures immediate enrollment and educational stability for homeless children and youth. Sally Straathof is the homeless liaison for the Concrete School District. CHILD FIND

Child Find is a continuous process of public awareness activities, screening and evaluation designed to locate, identify and refer as early as possible all young children with disabilities and/or children who meet the McKinney-Vento definition of homeless. If you know of a child who lives within the Concrete School District who is newly born to five years old and who might need special education services, or children who might be homeless, please contact Leilani Thomas, Special Services Director at **360-853-4008**.

HIGHLY CAPABLE PROGRAM

A highly capable (HC) learner is defined as "a student who has been assessed to have superior intellectual ability as exhibited by cognitive ability, specific academic achievement, and exceptional creativity" (OSPI, 2009). It offers enrollment to students K-12. Students can be referred to this program by education staff, teachers, and parents. A referral to the program does not guarantee enrollment. Parents are required to give written permission before testing, identifying, and placement.

Highly capable students will be required to participate in several different types of tests. Testing will include but is not limited to the Woodcock Johnson IV, Kaufman Brief Intelligence Test 2 (KBIT2), and SIGS. Tests will be administered by the school psychologist. Additional data will be collected for review: grades, state assessments and district assessments.

Students identified as highly capable will be taught by highly capable teachers who will individualize their instruction to accommodate the educational needs of the identified students. Students enrolled in the highly capable program may be provided opportunities for accelerated learning, grouping arrangements that provide intellectual and interest peer group interactions, K-12 cooperative agreements between schools and institutions of higher education, and/or mentorships and career exploration opportunities.
